A **COFFEE HOUSE BENEFIT** at the Fr. Landry Center will be jam-packed with local talent, including performances by *Water To Wine*, *Adoration*, *The PF Flyers*, and other contemporary Christian musicians.

Pizza, desserts, and beverages will be available for purchase.

WELCOME INN is an ecumenical effort of churches in our community who pull together to run this ministry for the three coldest months of the year, from mid-December through mid-March.

The shelter is open 12 hours a day, five days a week. In 2007/2008 the Welcome Inn provided a warm safe environment and a daily lunch to 314 different individuals who otherwise would have congregated at the local libraries, bus stations, and business establishments. Over 3300 meals were served, over 600 bus tickets distributed, and over 134 volunteers logged in 2675 hours of service.

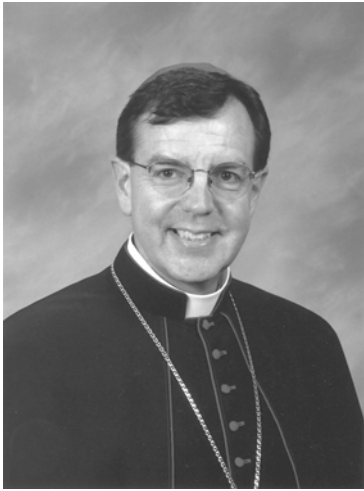

A New Archbishop for the Archdiocese of Detroit

Bishop Allen H. Vigneron, who has led the Diocese of Oakland, California, since 2003, will be the new Archbishop of Detroit. This appointment by Pope Benedict XVI brings the archbishop-elect back home to southeast Michigan, where he served 27 years as a parish priest, seminary rector/president, and an auxiliary bishop.

Archbishop-Elect Vigneron gave the following remarks at a news conference held January 5, 2009 at Sacred Heart Major Seminary:

Today marks the first page in a new chapter of both my life's story and that of the Church in the Archdiocese of Detroit. As part of that record, I would like to share with you a little of what fills my mind and heart today. Shortly after New Year's 2003, I learned that Pope John Paul II was sending me to California to be the bishop of the Church in Oakland. I went willingly because I was confident that in accepting this mission I was embracing God's loving

will for me: Christ had spoken through His Vicar. Now, six years later, His Vicar has spoken again, and it is with that same trusting faith that I take up my new mission as the Archbishop of Detroit.

I come to this moment with great praise and thanks to God the Father because of His gracious Providence, for in providing for the needs of His Church, He is filling my life with the blessings that are sure to come from my service of His people in Southeast Michigan.

I take this opportunity to express, also, my gratitude to our Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI, for the confidence he has shown in me by calling me to be the principal pastor of the Archdiocese of Detroit. My answer of "yes" to his call is the fruit of my communion with him, the Successor of Peter, in the life and faith handed on to us from the Apostles. I have promised him, and I promise all the faithful of the archdiocese, that this Catholic communion will be the touchstone of my ministry in the archdiocese.

I deeply appreciate the warm welcome which Cardinal Maida has extended to me from the very first that he learned of my appointment. We have worked closely together in the past; I have no doubt that in the new set of relationships into which we are now entering, we will continue to collaborate effectively for the building up of the Church. As I begin the process of taking over from Cardinal Maida the pastoral care of the archdiocese, it is not too soon to pay tribute to him for his wise leadership and generous service.

On this first day of my appointment as archbishop, my thoughts and prayers are particularly focused on the priests, the deacons and seminarians, the religious and the lay faithful I will serve here. Because I am a son of this archdiocese, they have long been dear to me. Now that I have become the spiritual father of this local Church, they are even dearer. With the help of God's grace, I will love them and care for them; and I look forward to receiving from them the love for me which the Holy Spirit will stir up in their hearts.

When I began my remarks, I made reference to the new chapter in the history of the archdiocese which begins today. The unfolding of the Church's history always occurs within the context of the history of the age. Today, here, that means Southeast Michigan's struggle to find a new way to establish a vibrant economy, so that families have sufficient resources to obtain not only the material goods, but the spiritual as well, that they need in order to flourish. I recognize that this challenge for our civic community is – as all societal problems are – a pastoral challenge as well. To that challenge, as I begin my service as archbishop, I want to bring all the riches of grace which the Holy Spirit has bestowed on the Church.

By my reckoning, two particular graces stand out: the grace of hope and the grace of wisdom. About the grace of wisdom: In the matter of solving even the most practical problems, while material resources are important, human creativity and intelligence are the resources which count the most. The Church, with the wealth of her social teaching, has a particular set of insights to contribute towards the solution of our economic problems. In my service as archbishop, I will do all that I can to see to it that these spiritual resources are available to those responsible for charting our community's way forward. About the grace of hope: The flag and seal of the City of Detroit speak hope – *Spera Meliora*, "Hope for better things." Even more than a call for, they command us to hope. Were this hope founded only in ourselves alone, it would inevitably disappoint. But the Christian community which I am being appointed to lead testifies that we are right to hope even in times of trial, because our hope is rooted in God who is faithful, in the Father, who in Jesus Christ, has come to dwell with us and will never abandon us. This hope, born of faith, is an invaluable contribution which the Catholics of the archdiocese offer our community as we face the social and economic changes of our time.

As I move toward the end of these remarks, I want to express my respect and love for the Church in Oakland: for her priests and deacons and for the people we have served together. Even though I experience great peace in accepting the call to Detroit because I know it is God's will, this peace comes with great sadness at parting. My years of pastoral service in the Diocese of Oakland, while not without significant challenges, have been filled with blessings I will never forget. It is with these thoughts and feelings and aspirations that I come to Detroit. And at this new beginning, as I was taught so often in the churches and chapels and schools of the archdiocese, I entrust everything to the maternal protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Food For The Poor

Now celebrating its 26th year of operation, Food For The Poor is an interdenominational Christian relief and development organization working primarily in 16 countries in the Caribbean, Latin America and the United States to assist the poorest of the poor. By working together with pastors, missionaries and churches in all the regions, we ensure that the aid is reaching those who need it the most.

- Food For The Poor does much more than simply feed the millions of hungry poor. We drill life-giving water wells for those who otherwise wouldn't have clean drinking water, we provide lifesaving medical care, we build homes for families without adequate shelter, we provide skills training and micro-enterprise opportunities to enable the poor to work and we give children an education that will enable them to break free from the cycle of poverty that has ensnared generations.
- Since its founding in 1982, Food For The Poor has distributed more than 43,900 tractor-trailer loads of aid to the poor of the region. We have also built 46,419 housing

units for people desperately in need of adequate shelter, and completed 568 water projects that provide lifesaving water and sanitation to hundreds of thousands of villagers that previously had none.

- In 2007, Food For The Poor shipped more than 4,340 tractor-trailer loads of aid valued at \$962 million and built 6,345 new housing units in the region.
- Total support received for 2007 was \$1,035,000,000; direct program expenses were \$1,004,000,000.
- Fundraising and other administrative costs comprised less than 4% of our 2007 expenses; over 96% of all donations went directly to programs that help the poor.
- There are currently 18 Jamaican and 17 Haitian fishing villages in operation, with an additional 3 villages underway. FFP by supplies destitute coastal villages with boats, motors, sheds, freezers and training in deep-sea fishing, transforming communities by offering them hope and a real opportunity to improve their lives.
- Our fruit tree program, started in 2007, has accomplished the planting of over 100,000 fruit trees, and our goal for 2008 is

to multiply this achievement in Haiti.

- We have completed 52 producing tilapia ponds that supply much needed protein to communities, feeding programs and schools.
- Our Angels Of Hope program sponsors 3,585 children in 87 orphanages throughout the Caribbean and Latin America. The children receive food, clothing, shelter, education and lots of love and attention. During 2007, more than 450 orphanages received aid from Food For The Poor.
- Forbes magazine has given Food For The Poor outstanding ratings of 96% in charitable commitment and 97% in fundraising efficiency. December 2007
- Food For The Poor received the highest possible ratings, Four Stars, from Charity Navigator for 2007, and Five Stars from Ministry Watch for 2007.
- The Chronicle of Philanthropy has ranked Food For The Poor as the largest international charity in the US, and the 5th largest charity in the nation. October 2008

A Special Message from Cardinal Maida on the Holy Year Dedicated to Saint Paul

Dear Friends in Christ,


Earlier this year, our Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI commenced a holy year in honor of the Apostle to the Gentiles, St. Paul, in celebration of the two-thousandth anniversary of his birth. During this holy year, which will conclude on June 29, 2009, the Holy Father extends to all of the faithful an opportunity to receive a Plenary Indulgence upon the completion of the required conditions (sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, prayers for the Supreme Pontiff's intention). This Plenary Indulgence can be received by making a pilgrimage to the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls in Rome, as well as to churches designated as pilgrimage sites by the Bishop of each diocese.

To make reception of the Plenary Indulgence readily available to all of the faithful, I have designated certain churches as pilgrimage sites here in the Archdiocese. These churches are identified in the attached decree.

A holy year is an opportunity for all of us to grow spiritually, as well as to deepen our understanding and appreciation of the treasury of spiritual graces that are available to us through the Church. Specifically, an indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian, who is duly disposed, gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the church.

As we join with Catholic Christians around the world in prayer during this holy year, may we become more and more aware of the great love God has for us, and imitate the missionary zeal and courage of St. Paul.

DECREE

I, Adam Cardinal Maida, Archbishop of Detroit, for the joyful occasion of the Jubilee Year celebrating the Apostle St. Paul, which will conclude on June 29, 2009, in accord with the decree issued by the Apostolic Penitentiary on May 10, 2008, declare that the Christian Faithful of the Archdiocese of Detroit, having fulfilled the required conditions (sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, prayers for the Supreme Pontiff's intentions), and in a spirit of total detachment from any inclination to sin, may benefit from a Plenary Indulgence for their sanctification when they take part devoutly in a sacred function or in a pious public exercise in honor of the Apostle to the Gentiles, on (1) the days of the solemn opening and closing of the Pauline Year in all Catholic churches and chapels in the Archdiocese and (2) other days throughout the Year of St. Paul in the following churches designated as pilgrimage sites within the Archdiocese:

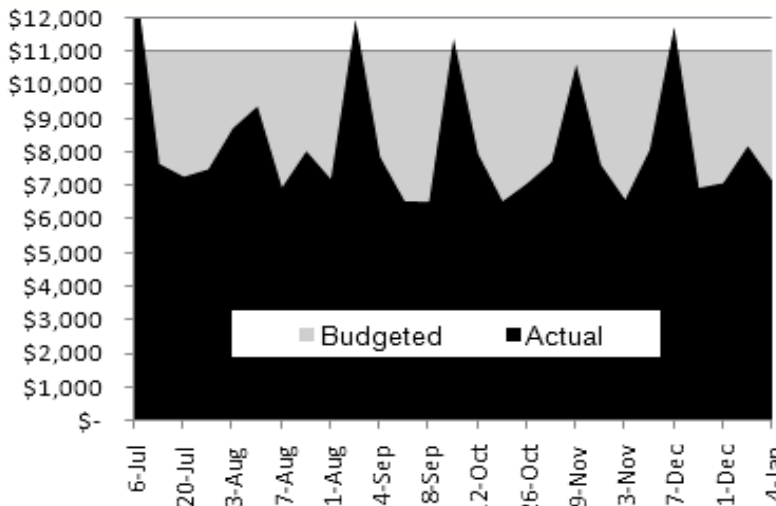
